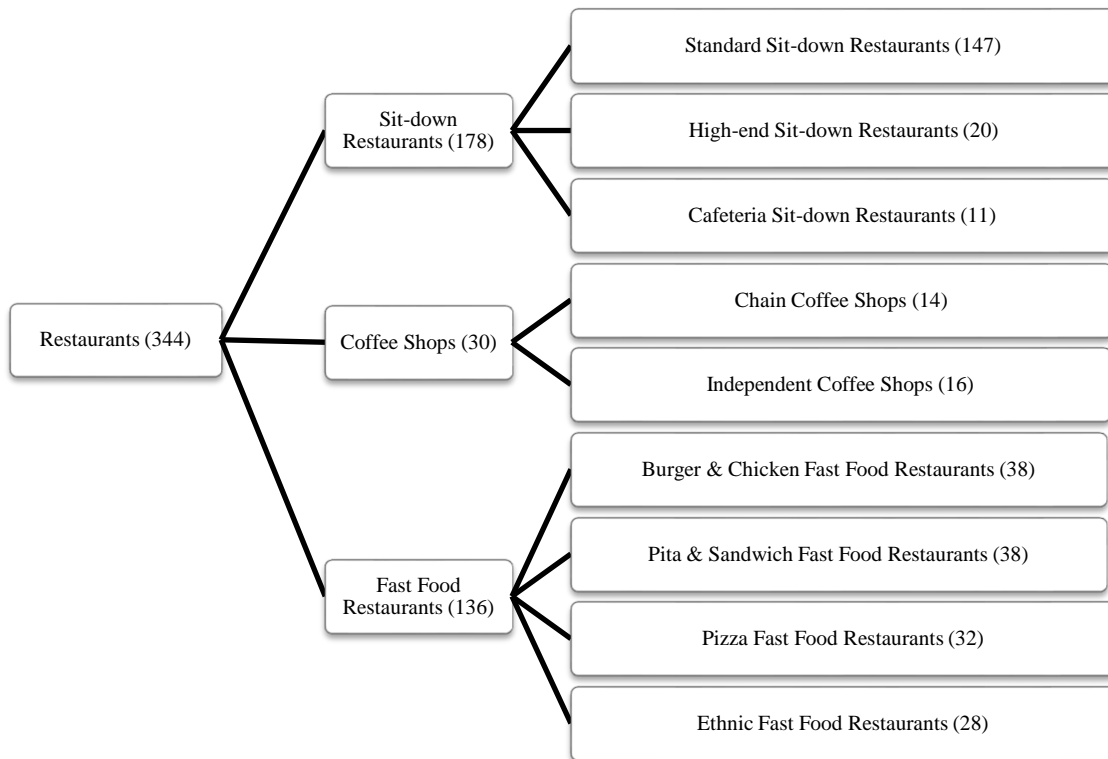


## Supplementary Figure 1



Restaurant sub-categories\* (numbers) in residential neighbourhoods, Saskatoon

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\* Sit-down restaurants include restaurants that offer full table service by wait staff, and cafeteria sit-down restaurants where customers go to serving counters/stalls to pick their food. Coffee shop category includes restaurants where coffee and/or baked food/pastries are the main items sold. Fast food restaurants are characterized by no or minimal table service and by food that is cooked at least in part in advance and is supplied quickly after ordering, and include those restaurants that are take-out only.
